Southend getting ready to reopen and welcome back visitors safely

A multi-faceted plan has been put in place to ensure the Borough is fully prepared and ready to welcome back visitors and keep residents safe as national restrictions ease as part of the government's roadmap out of lockdown.

Led by Southend-on-Sea Borough Council and developed with the local stakeholder group that includes traders, Leigh Town Council, Southend BID and Southend Tourism Partnership, plans and resources will focus on town centre, open spaces, seafront and beaches.

In line with the government's timeline for easing out of lockdown, plans for Southend include:

- Extra resources being deployed from 29 March for the peak season including toilet attendants at key locations, additional cleaning staff for open spaces, beach combers and evening cleaning.
- Extra medical support will be in place over Easter Weekend and other key dates
- Additional larger 'EuroBins' will be put in place in seafront locations
- Additional litter picking and bin emptying will take place in our main parks at weekends and during the school holidays, with four staff based at Belfairs Park, Priory Park, Chalkwell Park and Southchurch Park from 11:30am to 7:30pm.
- Additional litter picking and bin emptying will also take place at Thorpe Bay Gardens, Shoebury Common, Leigh Cliffs and Marine Parade/Belton Hills (in addition to Southend Cliffs, Prittlewell Square, Warrior Square Gardens. Two extra mobile litter pickers will support other areas



- Additional temporary toilets will be installed in Old Leigh, City Beach, Shorefields, Darlows Green
- Additional toilet cleaning will take place at weekends and school holiday at Belfairs Park, Priory Park and Southchurch Park
- Additional hand sanitizer stations
- From 12 April, six extra seasonal foreshore staff will be in place to accommodate expected higher demand and providing first aid, information, advice and guidance. They will be located at Jubilee Beach (first aid base), Shoebury Common Slipway, Two Tree Island and Old Leigh. The Jubilee Beach office will be open for extended hours.

Reopening businesses safely

The Council is also engaging with businesses and stakeholders offering advice and considerations about reopening safely and responsibly. Guidance includes how to run a COVID-secure establishment such as risk assessments, use of face coverings, social distancing, one-way systems, number restrictions, use of electronic payment, pre-booking and test and trace information. A dedicated regulatory service email to provide advice for businesses who may have positive test results in their workforce is also in place.

The safety advisory group (SAG) will also be working with event organisers to design COVID-secure events and liaise with them on any event applications.

A team of four compliance ambassadors will continue work in the community and visit premises to check compliance and signpost to guidance. Ambassadors will always look to engage with non-compliant premises in the first instance with enforcement being the last resort.

Jacqui Dallimore, Managing Director, Roslin Beach Hotel and Chairman of the Southend Tourism Partnership, said:

"Last year saw the Southend Tourism Partnership launch Southend Safe, a scheme designed to help the hospitality and leisure sector operate safely as they began to reopen. So we have experience of this process and of what is required. Partnership members and the council have been working closely throughout the pandemic and I am very hopeful that we can confidently and safely encourage and re-welcome visitors back to the town, local residents out to our venues, and help our businesses get back on track. To our customers old and new, we have missed you and are looking forward to seeing you again soon, safely."

Community safety

In addition to our security base at Jubilee Beach, a new frontline security base in Old Leigh is now operational and is located inside the Leigh Heritage Centre. This will be used by our community safety officers (CSOs). Other council departments and partners including the police will also be invited to use the base to enhance the overall visible presence in the area.



An extra officer will be deployed to monitor our CCTV suite at weekends with a particular focus on the seafront.

The community safety team will also be gathering specific seafront data and insights to help prioritise our resources and inform our partnership work with the police. Carl Robinson, Director of Public Protection, said: "Public safety is of paramount importance and, working closely with the police and other community partners, we will provide a greater security presence. Our team of CSOs will provide a patrolling presence and seek to reduce crime, anti-social behaviour and the fear of crime by providing reassurance, assistance and help to create a safer, more pleasant environment."

Parking

All car parks will be open from 29 March and parking suspensions lifted apart from a small number that are in place to support social distancing for businesses in pinch point areas. New parking fees come into effect on 1 April and all car parks and onstreet parking will be chargeable. Enforcement of all restrictions borough-wide will resume on 29 March 2021; this will include the 1-hour restrictions in residential areas.

Additional car park security will be in place at all key seafront car parks to help ensure traffic flow if they become busy and direct drivers to other car parks if necessary. Visit our website for more information on car parking charges and the Southend Pass.

Communications and signage

Enhanced signage and messages developed by Southend BID and the council will be in place to encourage residents and visitors to demonstrate safe and respectful behaviour. This will include encouraging everyone to take more responsibility for their waste and rather than leave rubbish next to a full bin, find an alternative bin or take it home.

There will be further messaging to #StaySafeStayApart and #StaySafeSouthend which will focus on the basic public health measures that everyone needs to follow such as Hands, Face and Space.

Scott Dolling, Director of Culture and Tourism, said: "Normally Southend-on-Sea welcomes over 7 million visitors in a year and contributes over £350m to the local economy, supporting thousands of jobs but the past year has been exceptionally challenging for our hospitality and accommodation sector - arts, culture, events and more.

"As lockdown eases over the coming weeks and months, we want Southend to bounce back as we reopen and welcome visitors back so our businesses, that rely heavily on tourism, can thrive and get the economy moving.

"As part of Southend's roadmap to recovery, we have worked very closely with businesses, voluntary/community organisations and event organisers, to address the Council's economic recovery priorities, and to listen to ideas for improving economic prospects in the wake of the pandemic."



Krishna Ramkhelawon, director of public health for Southend-on-Sea said: "We fully expect the numbers of people travelling into Southend this summer for a staycation to be higher than ever before.

"We also know that Southend reopening and welcoming back visitors will be a cause for concern for many. Fighting coronavirus and keeping our residents' safe is a priority for us and will be the driving factor behind any decisions we take.

"At this time last year, COVID-19 was new to the world and many were taken by surprise. But now we have experience of living with the virus and our collaborative approach with the police, business and other partners will ensure Southend is ready and prepared as we move out of lockdown.

"After consultation with local businesses and stakeholders, we are opening a new COVID LFD rapid testing site for people with no symptoms. Located on the seafront opposite the pier entrance, anyone can walk in and get tested without an appointment. This is ideally located for seafront businesses and their staff to get tested as well as visitors.

"Encouraging people to visit Southend must not be at the expense of people's health. Our communities should feel reassured that the huge amount of planning already underway should allow people to travel into Southend and enjoy what the borough has to offer, while keeping both residents and visitors safe.

"Please continue to follow the rules in place, and if meeting outdoors from 29 March, please stay safe and stay two metres apart from those you don't live with."

2) <u>Temporary Road Closures</u>

a) Western Road, Leigh-On-Sea – Emergency Sewer Repairs – 29th March for 1 week

To facilitate emergency sewer repairs; they have imposed a prohibition of traffic in Western Road, Leigh-On-Sea.

Over-70s to get boost vaccines from September

People aged over 70 are due to get booster coronavirus vaccines from September to protect them from new virus variants. Vaccines minister Nadhim Zahawi said some people will have three doses within the first 10 months of the jabs being in use, with the over-70s, health and social care staff and the clinically vulnerable the first to receive them.



Infection levels rise among secondary school children in England

COVID-19 infection levels have risen slightly among secondary school-age children in England in the second week that pupils were back in classrooms, figures from the Office for National Statistic show. For school years 7 to 11, in the week up to 20 March, 0.43 per cent of children on average tested positive for coronavirus, up from 0.32 per cent the week before.

Few people with coronavirus symptoms are self-isolating, study finds

A study of the test and trace system has found that fewer than one in five people request a COVID-19 test if they have symptoms, while the number who follow full self-isolation rules is as low as 43 per cent. The report, published in the British Medical Journal, also found that only half of people knew the main coronavirus symptoms. Cllr Paulette Hamilton, Vice Chair of the LGA's Community Wellbeing Board, said the findings of the latest study were "concerning". She said it was "critical that everyone does the right thing and self-isolates when required. Key to this is making sure people understand what self-isolation means, feel able to comply and are supported to do so if necessary."

Second vaccine doses outnumber first jabs for first time in single day

The number of second doses of COVID-19 vaccine administered in the UK in a single day has exceeded first doses for the first time. A total of 270,526 second doses were registered on Tuesday, compared with 224,590 first jabs, according to the latest government figures. The total number of first doses given so far is almost 31 million.

Bin the litter louts

Clean Up Britain is calling for tougher fines for litter louts as the volume of litter increases in parks and open spaces amid the easing of lockdown rules. Fly-tipping and littering costs councils £58 million a year to clear up.

Secretary of State Robert Jenrick MP published written Ministerial Statement to Parliament on measures to support businesses to reopen, operate safely and recover:

- Continuing current temporary extensions to construction working hours until 30 September
- Encouraging councils take flexible approach to planning enforcement so retailers can extend opening hours
- Extending current flexible approach to planning enforcement to allow retailers of food and essential items to increase delivery frequency
- Encourage councils work in supporting social distancing measures on high streets

- Guidance on how staff in early years setting can access rapid coronavirus testing
- Updated guidance on remote education good practice guidance.

The Insolvency Service

- Announced extension of temporary insolvency measures providing businesses support. Measures will be extended until the end of June 2021
- Statutory demands and winding-up petition will continue to be restricted to protect companies from creditor enforced action
- Small suppliers will not have to continue supply a business in insolvency

Entry to moratorium will remain relaxed and entry will be subject to insolvency procedure



Summary of Covid-19 related Government announcements 27th – 29th March 2021

Downing Street

The PM led today's COVID-19 press conference, with England's CMO Chris Whitty and CSO Patrick Vallance. Key points include:

- Today being a 'big day', as the first opportunity to meet others outdoors. Groups of 6, or 2 households, can now meet outside.
- Vaccinating elderly and most vulnerable has driven down hospitalisations.
 Public are encouraged to take up second doses.
- Long-term UK vaccine manufacturing capabilities are being built up to provide 50-60m vaccines. Novavax will be produced at Fujifilm, and GlaxoSmithKline will finish and bottle vaccines in the North East.
- The PM encourages the public to take up exercise and build resilience.
- The PM urges caution, and reminds the public of Hands, Face, Space, and Fresh Air.
- Hospitalisations and deaths in the UK continue to fall.
- Updates on travel abroad will be announced from April 5.

DOHSC

- In a press release, the public are reminded they must stay outside when meeting others.
- In a press release, a New Office for Health Promotion will drive improvement of the nation's health, by tackling obesity, improving mental health and promoting physical activity.
- In a press release, more than 30m people in the UK have received first doses as the NHS prepares to administer second doses in the coming weeks.
- In a press release, all employers can offer their employees free, rapid and regular testing that can be taken at home.
- Test and Trace guidance reflects the change in rules for when a group enters a venue. From 29 March, every customer or visitor should be asked to scan the NHS QR code or provide their name and contact details, not just a lead member.

PHE

- In a press release, the JCVI recommends that adults living with adults who are immunosuppressed should be prioritised for the COVID-19 vaccine.
- o A response letter from Matt Hancock to the JCVI is also published.

- In a press release, Ofsted will not return to a full programme of graded inspections until September. Ofsted will inspect schools and FES providers this summer term to provide reassurance about how well learners are catching up.
- o The OFSTED rolling update reflects this change.
- Guidance for Early Years and childcare providers includes updated information on shielding, asymptomatic testing, Test and Trace payments for parents, parent and child groups: singing, educational visits and resuming Ofsted visits.

Summary of Covid-19 related Government announcements 31st March 2021

From 1 April, clinically extremely vulnerable people in England will no longer be advised to shield

DHSC has updated guidance for how people can gain help with daily activities outdoors, and includes information on:

- getting around in unfamiliar settings
- communicating with others
- going shopping
- exercising

Guidance has been updated

• on working safely with additional information on ventilation, and tests.



- Specific updates have also been made to test and trace requirements for hospitality, tourism, leisure, and close contact services.
- There are also updates regarding operating fitting rooms safely for shops and branches.
- for owners and operators on safer public spaces

DfE has updated guidance on transport to school to reflect the announcement that a confirmatory Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test is now required following a positive Lateral Flow Device (LFD) test result in England.

New planning laws have been announced to support high streets:

- A new fast track for extending public service buildings including schools, colleges, universities and hospitals
- An amendment of existing permitted development rights for ports, so that they
 have the same freedoms as airports for undertaking development
- Amendments to the demolition permitted development right, to ensure the removal of unlisted heritage assets is subject to due process and proper consultation

The **Commission on Race and Ethnic Disparities** has published a report into racial and ethnic disparities in the UK. The report makes 24 recommendations which are grouped into four broad themes:

- build trust
- promote fairness
- create agency
- achieve inclusivity

This includes the recommendation to establish The Office for Health Disparities which the report recommends would work alongside existing local health workers and utilise best practice examples from councils and public health regional offices.

Summary of Covid-19 related Government announcements 1st April 2021

Natural England

- Natural England has launched a new Countryside Code to help people enjoy countryside in a safe and respectful way.
- o Defra and Natural England have also created a partner toolkit for councils to use in their local communications. Councils are encouraged to adapt these materials to suit their own needs.

DfE

• A new grant is announced to support approved exam centres with meeting the costs of providing assessment for private candidates this year.



- o Approved exam centres will receive £200 per private entry to ensure that candidates can access a centre at a similar cost to a normal exam year.
- o The JCQ published a list of centres that are willing to support private candidates, including home educated students and adult learners, to access GCSE, AS, and A level grades this year.
- o Private candidates are encouraged to use this list to find a centre and make arrangements before the entry deadline of 26 April.

NHS

- A letter to the health sector is published on the next steps for the vaccination of adult household contacts of severely immunosuppressed people.
- o The letter encourages GP practices to inform severely immunosuppressed adults that their household contacts are eligible to receive the COVID-19 vaccine.
- o It reiterates that, over the next few weeks, the health sector should focus on ensuring individuals in JCVI priority cohorts 1-9 are protected, before moving on to vaccinate cohort 10.
- NHS England has launched the COVID-19 Vaccine Equalities Connect and Exchange Hub, aimed at anyone working on improving vaccine uptake.
- o The Hub supports people to connect and exchange ideas on increasing vaccine uptake and can be used to find the latest evidence and resources; Connect and collaborate with colleagues; Share ideas; Join a series of lunch and learns;
- o To join, please register for a Future NHS account. Once registered you can then request to join the Hub. Request an account and join the Hub: https://future.nhs.uk/

Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy

- A £5 bn Restart Grants Scheme is announced today, providing funding to eligible businesses through councils. Full guidance is available.
- o Businesses in the non-essential retail sector in England will be eligible for one-off grants of up to £6,000, while businesses in the hospitality, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym sectors, which are reopening later, will be eligible for one-off grants of up to £18,000.
- o Yesterday a letter thanked council chief executives for supporting businesses over the last 12 months. The letter also encourages councils to ensure businesses in their area receive the new grants as soon as possible.

MHCLG

• A summary of responses and the government response is published, to the technical consultation on how to implement the new model for Shared Ownership.



MHCLG has also published the government's response to the proposals on securing First Homes.

- The PM has appointed Sara Khan as the government's Independent Adviser for Social Cohesion and Resilience, as part of Government efforts to tackle extremism in local communities.
- o Sara will work with frontline experts to understand the negative impact of extremism in local communities and develop recommendations on how to better support and protect victims of extremism, and those working to eradicate it, as well as communities that are affected.

EU Transition Support for Businesses

- · Webinars and videos about EU trading are available for councils to share with local stakeholders and businesses.
- o A full calendar of webinars for organisations that trade with the EU can be found on GOV.UK. Live webinars taking place next week include 'HMRC Exporting: what you need to do keep your goods moving' and 'HMRC Importing: what you need to know about Staged Controls'.
- Businesses can also use the Brexit Checker tool on GOV.UK, which will provide a personalised list of the most up to date actions that businesses need to take.
