# Households will be urged to recycle less to cut back on waste

Recyclers will be warned they may need to put less in their recycling bins as part of a government overhaul of waste disposal. Ministers are set to ask households in England to be more selective in what they recycle, in the hope that this will increase recycling rates by reducing the volume of material which needs to be separated at waste processing centres and sent to landfill.

# **UK food inflation falls**

Food inflation in the UK fell in May after more than a year of sharp increases in the price of food. The British Retail said annual food inflation eased this month from 15.7 per cent to 15.4 per cent, even as the overall rise in shop prices hits a new high.

# Ministers consider banning flavoured vapes

Ministers are considering further vaping laws, such as a ban on colourful branding or flavours, to deter their sale to children amid calls for plain packaging to be extended to the products. No 10 said the Government was considering "further steps" on vaping, with a call for evidence due to close next week.

# Children admitted to hospital due to vaping, schools tell parents

Two head teachers in Hampshire have written to parents warning of a spate of hospital admissions among schoolchildren who have been using suspected illegal



vapes. It follows warnings from health officials about the proliferation of illegal vapes containing dangerous chemicals such as lead and nickel, which are being sold to children.

# Multi-cancer blood test shows promising results in NHS study

A blood test for more than 50 types of cancer has shown 'real promise' in a major NHS trial conducted by Oxford University. The test correctly revealed two out of every three cancers among 5,000 people who had visited their GP with suspected symptoms, in England or Wales.

# **New hospital target**

The Government's pledge to build 40 new hospitals by 2030 includes ones that are instead refurbishments or the addition of new wings on existing sites, Health Secretary Steve Barclay has confirmed. It was revealed last week that up to eight of the original sites may not see work completed by the deadline, and that some hospitals at risk of collapse and in need of an upgrade will instead be added.

### E-bike fire risk

Electric bikes that pose a fire and electric shock risk have been found listed for sale on eBay, Amazon and Wish.com following a steep rise in incidents, according to charity Electrical Safety First. Over a dozen devices, several with substandard, unfused plugs, were available for sale on all three websites, with fire brigades warning that incompatible chargers paired with the wrong batteries can lead to catastrophic fires.

# **NHS** appointments axed

Over half a million hospital appointments a year are reportedly set to be axed in an attempt to reduce the backlog, according to Professor Stephen Powis, NHS Medical Director. A list of 58 procedures and treatments that should no longer be provided is being finalised, as part of plans to save at least £250 million a year.

# Pothole spending drop

Councils are spending a third less on filling potholes as they were eight years ago, opting for cheaper options to tackle the backlog, according to analysis by the Asphalt Industry Alliance. Research shows that £96 million was spent last year, compared to £144 million in 2015, with experts saying councils are being forced into the less expensive, shorter-term repairs as a result of funding constraints.

# **Emergency alert system cost**

The UK's emergency alert system, tested for the first time last month, will cost up to £25.3 million in its first three years, according to the Government. Responding to a parliamentary question, Baroness Neville-Rolfe said the costs included a contract worth up to £5 million with IT firm Fujitsu, which has been hired to work on the system, as well as £18.6 million in contracts to mobile network operators.

# Civil servants call off strike

Civil servants have called off planned industrial action following a government offer to engage in "meaningful talks" over pay. Strikes were planned on 7 June across government departments, but Members of the Prospect union have paused action.



The FDA union, which represents senior civil servants, has also suspended a ballot for action which was scheduled to start on Tuesday.

# Water companies discharge raw sewage

Eleven billion litres of raw sewage were discharged from a sample of 30 water company treatment works in one year, according to a study by Professor Peter Hammond, a mathematician who analyses data on sewage discharge. One water treatment works saw a volume of raw sewage released equivalent to 2,768 Olympic swimming pools.

# Mortgage rates rise

Higher than expected inflation figures have caused mortgage costs to rise this week, with the most significant increase up to 0.45 per cent on Friday. Figures earlier this week raised forecasts of how much UK interest rates will go up, with markets reportedly expecting the Bank of England to raise above their current level of 4.5 per cent to as high as 5.5 per cent.
