Plaque to commemorate Southend-on-Sea's tram network

A plaque that has been funded by BERA, has been fixed to the tram pole at the junction of Burges Road and Thorpe Hall Avenue on the golf course side, which celebrates that the pole was part of the overhead electric wiring for Southend-on-Sea's tram network. Please see the details of the plague below:

HISTORY

CITY OF SOUTHEND ON SEA

This Pole was part of the overhead electric wiring for Southendon-Sea's tram network.

<u>19 July,1901</u>



As the town of Southend-On-Sea expanded, there was a need for public transport, and so a 3 ft 6 inch (1,067 mm) gauge electric tramway, using overhead wires to supply the power, was constructed and opened for business on 19 July,1901. Lines ran from Victoria Circus, at the top of the High Street, to Leigh-on-Sea, to Southchurch, down to Thorpe Bay sea front.

The northern part of the eastern loop, from Southchurch to Thorpe Bay, was closed on 6 July,1938.

Slipper swap project aims to reduce trips and falls

Older residents living in Southend are being invited to exchange their worn-out slippers to help prevent trips and falls.

Through the slipper swap project, older and frail residents can swap their old slippers for a free brand-new pair which have design features to help prevent falls, such as secure fastenings and robust soles. Where necessary, residents will also be linked to other sources of support which could be beneficial.

Many older people are keen to stay independent at home, however walking indoors in worn-out slippers, barefoot or in socks can increase the risk of falls, slips and trips. This may result in spending time in hospital or receiving treatment at home which can make them feel less independent and more socially isolated.

Slipper Swap events will take place throughout November 2023 at the following venues:

No booking is required to attend these events, just turn up between 10am and 12pm and staff will be available to help you and introduce you to the Slipper Swap services and additional information if required.

The Slipper Swap project is being delivered in partnership with Southend on-Sea City Council's community engagement team and local groups and organisations.

Defibrillators - and where to find them

It means during a medical incident when a defibrillator is needed urgently, residents can check on the website and save precious time by locating the nearest defibrillator quickly.

Partners come together for Hate Crime Awareness Week

Southend-on-Sea City Council and partners are working together to highlight the importance of Hate Crime Awareness Week.

The Community Safety Partnership which comprises the council, police, fire, and Southend Association of Voluntary Services (SAVS) are working together to mark Hate Crime Awareness Week (14-21 October) with a powerful campaign aimed at raising awareness, providing support, and reinforcing the message that there is 'no place for hate' in Southend-on-Sea.

A hate crime is any crime perceived by the victim or any other person to be motivated by hostility or prejudice. It is a sad reflection of ignorance when individuals resort to verbal or physical abuse against those who are different.

Throughout the week, the Community Safety Partnership will host a series of events including Police activities at synagogues and mosques, the Fire Service will be doing hate crime assemblies at specific schools, and SAVs will be doing some educational

work with restorative justice. There will also be two pop-up events at the following locations:

Tuesday 17 October at Tesco (Prince Avenue) from 11am to 1pm Thursday 19 October at Asda (Shoeburyness) from 3pm to 5pm

Prime Minister's announcement on smoking

Prime Minister, last Wednesday, announced that he is to create a 'smokefree generation' by ending cigarette sales to children aged 14 and under.

This potentially significant public health intervention is aimed at reducing tobacco smoking which could reduce the burden on the NHS alongside other public health benefits.

In summary, the Government's announcement on Wednesday would see **the legal cigarette buying age rise** by one year each year for those born on or after 1 January 2009, to prevent them and future generations from legally smoking. The Prime Minister also announced the intention to more than **double the funding available for local stop smoking services** to support a total of around 360,000 people a year to quit smoking nationally.

The Government has also signaled its intention to **curb the rise in youth vaping** by consulting on measures to reduce the appeal and availability of vapes to children whilst ensuring vapes are available for adults to help them quit smoking. **Finally, it is proposed by the Government to strengthen enforcement activity,** through new funding and new powers.

Additional £8 billion for road repairs

An additional £8.3 billion will be provided to councils to help them maintain local roads, it has been reported. The funding will be delivered over 10 years and is as a result of money that is no longer being used to build the northern leg of HS2. The LGA previously highlighted that annual spending on road maintenance had been reduced from £4 billion in 2006 to £2 billion in 2019.

Traveller sites

The Gypsy Council has called on councils to do more to support legal traveller sites in their local areas. They say there are inconsistencies in provision for travellers between local areas. They highlight LGA guidance which suggests councils involve Gypsies and Travellers (GRT) in the planning process; consult with GRT communities early and often; be transparent to build trust; and integrate GRT accommodation needs into new planning systems.

Abuse of waste collection crews

There has been a doubling in the number of attacks on waste collection crews last year, reports suggest. According to freedom of information requests, 189 were attacked last year.

Labour pledge to provide additional NHS appointments

Labour has committed to provide £1.1 billion per year to ensure there were 40,000 out-of-hours appointments each week to tackle waiting lists. As the Labour Party conference begins in Liverpool, the party has also promised to work with councils to set up specialist further education colleges to tackle local skills shortages.

Police to target anti-social behaviour hot spots

Hotspot policing to counter anti-social behaviour is due to be rolled out across all police forces after successful trials took place. The measures have been trialled in

10 police forces and has cut incidents of such behaviour by up to a half but also reduced overall crime by 24 per cent.

Unwell over-50s at risk of poverty unless UK benefits rise, study finds

Thousands of Britons who are still up to 14 years away from receiving their state pensions and are too sick to work risk being consigned to years of poverty unless the Government reforms working age benefits, researchers have concluded. The Health Foundation think-tank said that welfare policy had yet to adjust to these new realities and called on ministers to bolster the value of Universal Credit.

Hiring boom fading but three-quarters of UK firms still struggle to find staff

Three-quarters of UK firms are still struggling to recruit staff, research has found, but the post-pandemic "jobs boom" appears to be in decline, with hiring intentions continuing to fall last month. A survey by the British Chambers of Commerce found that 73 per cent of the almost 5,000 companies it polled had faced hiring difficulties in the July to September quarter – a nine percentage point drop from the record high of 82 per cent in the final three months of 2022.

Repeat shoplifters could lose option for trial by jury

Repeat shoplifters could reportedly lose their right to opt for trial by jury in plans being considered that would help to clear the crown court backlog. Retailers have recorded a more than doubling of shoplifting offences during the past six years to reach eight million last year and costing the industry nearly £1 billion a year, according to the British Retail Consortium.

£200m of lottery cash will focus on 'clusters' of heritage in poorer areas

A new £200 million scheme will for the first time focus on clusters of heritage sites, including ancient monuments, protected landscapes, museums and an abbey, in specifically targeted, poorer areas of Britain. The new 10-year plan by the National Lottery Heritage Fund means the fund can spend its cash on preserving and improving a group of significant landmarks inside a concentrated development area, rather than only spending its money on individual projects.

Millions of Covid jabs stockpiled in case over-50s 'surge campaign' is needed to protect NHS

Millions of doses of the Covid vaccine are being stockpiled in case of a possible "surge campaign" to protect the over-50s against the virus and prevent the NHS from being overwhelmed this winter, it is reported.

Label ultra-processed foods 'addictive' to tackle obesity, say scientists

Scientists have said ultra-processed foods including chocolate bars should be labelled as "addictive substances" to help tackle soaring global obesity rates. Writing in the British Medical Journal, they argued junk food can be just as addictive as alcohol, tobacco or gambling and should be taxed and labelled to reflect this.

Ministers vow to protect children with action on disposable vapes

The Government will set out its plans for dealing with vapes so they are no longer targeted at children, in a consultation document to be published this morning. Among the options being considered are a complete ban on disposable vapes, restricting

their sale, and ensuring they cannot be sold in an array of flavours and colours which might appeal to youngsters.

Christmas lights

Councils across England are reportedly cancelling their Christmas lights, markets and cutting back on trees amid the cost of living crisis. Several towns and boroughs are facing budgetary challenges which have seen them cancel light switch-ons.

NHS waiting list rises

The waiting list for planned NHS treatment in England has gone up again to another record high of 7.75 million. The figure at the end of August was up more than 100,000 on the month before.

Royal Mint unveils new coin design

A new collection of coins bearing the face of the King has been unveiled by the Royal Mint, with designs inspired by plants and animals found across the four nations. The eight designs, overseen by King Charles, depict the flora and fauna found in different parts of the UK and reflect his interest in conservation and nature.
